Note L14e was a wartime issue (hence the temporary change of printer) and the colour of the frame is always much brighter than in any other issue of the 3/- stamp.

L14f and L14g (and also L5f and L5g) are classed together as "14 x 13 1/2" in some other catalogues. However, they are clearly different in several respects (e.g. in L141 the perforations extend right through the side selvedges of each sheet while in L14g they do not) and they differ on the long sides of the stamps by a full 1/2 perf, so we have no doubt of the need for listing them separately. The two machines were apparently used concurrently as is evidenced by the fact that the big re-entry, R9/4 is sometimes present and sometimes absent in both perforations. R9/4 is one of the most prominent re-entries to be found in the 1935-1947 Pictorials. Note: L14f(Y) - (U) and L14g(Y) - (U) can all be found in "pre-re-entries" form.
